A violent family living in an illegal outpost drives its cattle into Palestinian farmland. Oh—and the father also received money from the state to be there. The story of the killing of Amir Muhammad Shanran last Saturday in Susya actually began some 30 years ago. Thread.



1/ An Israeli man in uniform stands holding a weapon with its barrel pointed upward. Behind him stands another man—perhaps his younger brother—wearing civilian clothes and filming the event on his phone. >>

2/ Around them, the cries and wails of Palestinian women can be heard. A Palestinian man films the settler with his own phone. At one point, the camera captures a Palestinian man lying motionless on the ground. Perhaps dead. >>

3/ Perhaps critically wounded. Another settler soon rushes to the scene in a Ranger vehicle. All the while, just a few meters behind the soldier and the civilian, several cows continue grazing calmly. >>

4/ Eighteen seconds - that is the length of the video documenting the death of Amir Muhammad Shanran and the severe wounding of his brother Khaled last Saturday (7.3.2026) in the Palestinian village of Susya. >>

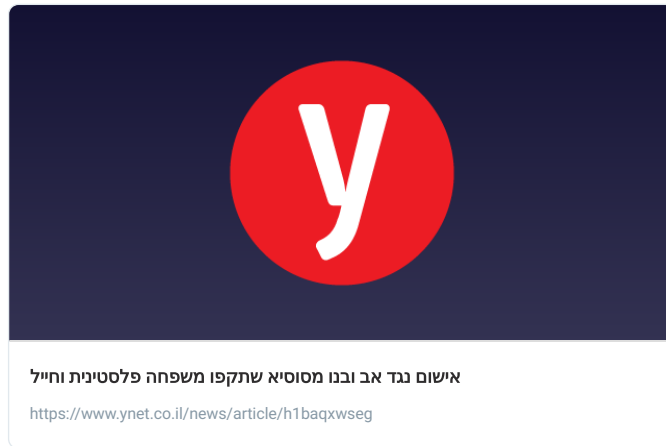
5/ The Israeli who shot and killed Amir Shanran and wounded his brother Khaled is a settler named Luria Luski. Perhaps he was serving in the reserves at the time, perhaps he simply mobilized himself. We have no way of determining this - and it is not really important. >>

6/ In the jungle that now prevails in the West Bank, any settler can put on a uniform and declare himself a soldier at any moment. Either way, the weapon he used to shoot the Shanran brothers was given to him by the army. >>

7/ Luria Luski is the son of Gadi Luski and the brother of Shem Tov Luski. Both have a record of involvement in serious violence against Palestinians—so serious that, in a very rare case,

they were actually prosecuted. >>

8/ Perhaps because, according to the indictment filed against them, they also attacked a soldier who tried to protect the Palestinians whose home the two had come to assault. >>



9/ We wrote briefly about the father Gadi and his son Shem Tov in November 2024, after yet another extreme incident of violence in which the foul-mouthed son was involved. >>



10/ But if the story must be summarized, here it is: the Luski family lives in an illegal outpost established about 30 years ago at the archaeological site that the settlers of Susya received as a gift from the state >>

11/ after it expropriated the land and expelled the Palestinians from the site in 1986. The Civil Administration issued demolition orders against all the settlers' construction there but "forgot" to enforce them. With no enforcement, the construction has continued ever since.

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12/ In 1997 the father, Gadi Luski, received a mortgage from the WZO Settlement Division that may, like in many similar cases, have later become a grant. According to the mortgage document, the money was given to purchase equipment for a carpentry workshop and to buy 20 sheep. >>

13/ Luski is hardly the only violent, law-breaking settler who received money from the Settlement Division. Here's a link to our investigation about these mortgages. >>

14/ Over the years, the Luskis abandoned sheep farming and, a few years ago, moved into cattle ranching—perhaps because cattle make it possible to control more land and expel more Palestinians. >>

15/ Next to their home in the illegal outpost at the site known as “Ancient Susya,” a cowshed was built—illegally, of course - and several dozen cattle were brought in. >>

16/ Since then, the Luskis have repeatedly driven their cows into the agricultural lands belonging to residents of the Palestinian village of Susya. >>

17/ Last Saturday, for example, they walked their herd more than a kilometer in order to graze the cows on land belonging to the Shanran family—simply to destroy their crops. >>

18/ Palestinians say that when the Shanran brothers tried to drive the cows out of their field, the brother—Luria, the soldier or self-appointed soldier—opened fire, killing one and critically wounding the other. Remember the cows calmly grazing in the video? >>

19/ This killing is not an isolated incident. That same week settlers shot and killed four additional Palestinian residents. >>

20/ The brothers Taha and Fahim Mu’ammam were shot on Monday (2.3.2026) while standing in the yard of their home in the village of Qaryut, north of the isolated and notoriously violent settlement of Shilo. >>

21/ Ta’ir and Fara Hameil were shot during a settler pogrom in the village of Khirbet Abu Falah, south of Shilo, on Saturday. Experience suggests that none of the shooters will pay any meaningful price—if any—for their actions, even when everything happens in front of a camera.>>

22/ The army’s misleading response, quoted in the Ynet report, reveals how routine the killing of Palestinian residents has become in the eyes of its spokespeople. >>

23/ The Idf: "According to an initial investigation of the incident, an IDF reservist who arrived at the scene following a report of an assault opened fire... It is known that two Palestinians were hit by gunfire, and one later died of his wounds". >>

24/ It turns out that under the most corrupt and racist Israeli government yet, any Israeli holding a weapon in the West Bank effectively also holds a license to kill Palestinians.

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
